of the
ONTARIO CURLING ASSOCIATION

MINUTES of the one hundred and eleventh Annual General Meeting of the Ontario Curling Association held at the Toronto Cricket, Skating & Curling Club on Thursday, May 10, 1984, starting at 2:30 p.m.

Joe Gurowka, President of the Association, chaired the meeting and Eric Wiffen acted as Secretary. The total attendance was 106. A total of 37 clubs were represented by 37 voting delegates and 14 non-voting delegates. Also in attendance were 26 members of the Executive Committee, 10 Past Presidents, 4 Honorary Life Members and 15 guests.

A list of those in attendance is attached to these Minutes.

The President welcomed the delegates and guests to the meeting and a moment of silence was observed in remembrance of departed members of the Association. The President made particular mention of Leon Sykes, Secretary/Treasurer of the Association for a period of 15 years.

A motion was proposed, seconded and approved "that the Minutes of the 1983 Annual General Meeting as circulated, be taken as read".

REPORT OF THE TECHNICAL, BUSINESS MANAGEMENT AND PROMOTIONS COMMITTEE

The Committee is recommending the name change to "Promotions & Public Relations", more descriptive to the Committee's duties and mandate.

The past year was the first with emphasis on promotions & public relations, subsequent to the technical programs being administered by the Ontario Curling Federation. The year was quite active for our Committee, but a year of uncertainty; no "Terms of Reference" are available. One of our first priorities next year is to develop such terms.

Close co-operation was maintained with Christopher Lang & Associates in implementing the Seagram's "Five Star" and "Minard's" programs. The "Five Star" awards and social nights were delayed too long to have the required impact that was expected. Similarly, the "Minard's" sample program was delayed and, as a result, the desired results were not received. Meetings are being arranged with Seagram's and Minard's to formulate next year's programs.

We paid for six advertisements in the Ontario Curling Report, and have received fair value for our investment. I wish to thank Donna Dilschneider for her co-operation and assistance.

Association decals have been produced and are being distributed.

The "History of Curling" has been completed and available for distribution. The Committee is presently reviewing the publication prior to reprinting, suggesting a new title and the requirement for further editing.

The Committee is also studying the feasibility of printing a general information brochure to be distributed throughout Ontario. The brochure will contain - What the O.C.A. does for curlers and curling in Ontario - The makeup of the O.C.A. and what each Committee is responsible for - and generally publicize the O.C.A. activities.

*We are also reviewing a) the need for a professional Public Relations firm to act for the Association,
b) seek out firms who would be willing to work with us and what they could offer the O.C.A.*

I wish to thank the Executive - Eric Wiffen, and our Committee Members, for the input into establishing and assistance to this year's programs.

The Report of the Technical, Business Management and Promotions Committee was presented by the Chairman, Norman Johnson, and the adoption of the report was moved, seconded and carried.

REPORT OF THE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

At last year's Annual Meeting, I reported that the O.C.A. was withdrawing from the instructional clinic program, mainly for economic reasons.

During the past year, we kept to our word by keeping our expenses for clinics to the bare minimum. Through the co-operation and hard work of the regional co-ordinators, who are situated between Ottawa and Windsor, many interested clubs in the O.C.A. area were able to put on clinics of their own. The clinic format and the expenses for the clinics was established and borne by the clubs and the participants.

The regional co-ordinators had access to the necessary equipment and films to help make the clinics successful, and their advice was sought for the selection of instructors.

The majority of the Labatts' instructional films owned by the O.C.A. were distributed for use through our Executive Director in his Toronto office. This distribution process ran very smoothly and the films were in constant use throughout the autumn and winter months.

With the change of format to in-club instructional clinics, we did not establish a formal system to report on the number of clinics and participants. However, from the informal reports I received, it appears that the number of clinics held this past season must have been equal to the previous year's total of 46 clinics and 1,400 participants.

In all, the past season was a successful one from an instructional point of view. I would like to take this opportunity to thank each of the regional co-ordinators for the time and effort he/she has put into this program.

Ontario Curling Federation - Instructor Courses

The instructor training program continues to be received enthusiastically by the curlers in the O.C.A. area. During the past season, four (4) Level I and one (1) Level II courses were conducted in southern Ontario. These were held at Leaside, Burlington, Smiths Falls, St. Thomas and London. A total of 177 curlers attended the Level I and 18 attended the Level II.

For next season, arrangements have been made to conduct six (6) Level I, one (1) Level II and one (1) Level III in the O.C.A. area. A notice of these courses will be forwarded to all clubs in due course.

In the absence of the Chairman, Keith Lawes, this report was presented by Joe Gurowka and the adoption of the report was moved, seconded and carried.

REPORT OF THE ORGANIZATION, CONSTITUTION AND RULES COMMITTEE

RULES CHANGES FOR 1984/85

References to rule and page numbers in this report pertain to the Ontario Curling Association Handbook - 1983, as previously revised for the 1983/84 season.

For 1984/85, changes are proposed affecting both the **RULES OF THE GAME** and **OCA RULES FOR COMPETITIONS** sections of the handbook.

The following changes to **THE RULES OF THE GAME** are proposed:

Re Rule 4, STONES (p.9)

Revise 4(2) to read:

- 4(2) No stone, including handle and bolt, shall be of greater weight than 44 lbs. (19.96 Kg.) or greater circumference than 36" (91.44 cm.) or of less height than 4.5" (11.43 cm.) measured between the bottom and top of the stone.

Re Rule 7, POSITION OF PLAYERS (p.12)

Revise to read:

7. POSITION OF PLAYERS

- (1) Members of the non-delivering team.
 - (a) Only the skip and vice-skip may stand behind the tee line at the playing end when the opposing team is delivering a stone and shall yield choice of place of position to the delivering team.
 - (b) The player whose turn is next to deliver a stone may take a stationary position by the backboard at the delivering end and to the side of the sheet.
 - (c) The players who and when not taking the positions 7(1)(a) or 7(1)(b) shall position themselves between the hog lines and to the extreme sides of the sheet when the opposing team is delivering a stone.

(d) The non-delivering team members shall not take a position or cause such motion that would obstruct, interfere with or distract the delivering team.

(2) Members of the delivering team.

(a) The skip or vice skip shall be positioned inside the hog line of the playing end while a stone is being delivered and shall have choice of place of position.

(b) The other members of the delivering team shall take any position outside the hog line of the playing end except when following or sweeping a stone.

Re Rule 9, SWEEPING (p.18)

Revise 9(6) to read:

9(6) The sweeping motion shall be from side to side across the entire running surface in front of the stone and clearly finish to either side of the stone and no sweeping or debris shall be left in front of a running stone when sweeping. When sweeping with a brush, no part of the handle shall be over the stone.

Re Rule 11, DISPLACED STATIONARY STONES (p.17, 18)

Revise 11 (1), (2), and (3) to read:

11. DISPLACED STATIONARY STONES

(1) If a stone which would have altered the course of a running stone is displaced by the playing team, the running stone shall be allowed to come to rest and may be left there or removed from play immediately at the discretion of the opposing skip.

(2) If the running stone is removed from play then all displaced stones shall be placed where the opposing skip considers they originally lay.

(3) If the running stone is left where it came to rest, then displaced stones must remain where they came to rest.

Re Rule 12, SCORING (p.19)

Revise 12 (4) to read:

12 (4) Every stone that is within 1.83 meters (6 feet) of the tee is eligible to be counted.

Re Rule 16, formerly MISCELLANEOUS (p.20)

Replace by new Rule 16, EQUIPMENT, to read:

16. EQUIPMENT

(1) That any equipment which may possibly come into contact with the ice surface may be subjected to inspection by the head official of the competition and rejected if that official feels such equipment is either faulty or is being used in a manner to provide an unfair advantage. (Examples - extremely dry corn broom, faulty slider.)

Re Rule 17, MISCELLANEOUS (p.20)

Wording, unchanged from former Rule 16, to read:

17. MISCELLANEOUS

- (1) Should any situation occur which is not covered by the rules, the decision shall be made in accordance with equity.

The following changes to **ONTARIO CURLING ASSOCIATION RULES FOR COMPETITIONS** are proposed:

NOTE: At the next reprinting of the handbook the term "inter-zone" will be replaced by the term "regional", meanwhile the terms are synonymous.

Re ZONES AND REGIONS (p.21)

Revise Rule 2 to read:

- 2(1) The member clubs shall be arranged in sixteen zones.
- (2) The zones shall be arranged in four regions of four zones each.

Re NOTICE OF ENTRY (p.24)

Revise by inserting 10(2)(b)(v) to read:

- 10(2)(b)(v) Notwithstanding the foregoing, the exception zone playdown formats referred to in Rule 11(4) (page 25 - see below) may involve acceptance of additional team entries from one or more clubs in the zone in accordance with the format provisions. This practice is sanctioned provided that all entries pay the prescribed OCA entry fee for the competition in question and are otherwise fully qualified.

Re THE DRAW (p.25)

Revise 11(4) to read:

- 11(4) Except in double-team competitions, all sub-zone, zone, and regional playdowns shall be double knock-out in format. In these single team competitions at zone and regional level playdowns, the two respective winners of the 'Winners' (i.e. undefeated team winning the 'A' side) and 'Losers' (i.e. single loss team winning the 'B' side) brackets of the draw qualify to proceed to the next level of the competition.

Exception: At the discretion of the OCA member club representatives of the clubs involved, the two zone winners qualifying for regional playdowns may be selected on the basis of playdown formats involving other than double knock-out and/or participation by additional teams beyond some clubs' normal entitlement, provided that:

- the zone's playdown format is formally pre-defined with provision for supply of a documented format description on request of potential entrants. (For example, some zones elect to accept additional entries to expand or "fill" the double knock-out draw to a predetermined number such as 16, while at least one zone utilizes a single knock-out format for at least one zone-level competition.)

Re INTERMEDIATES COMPETITION (p.40)

Revise 2 to read:

2. The thirty-two winners of the sixteen zone playdowns shall meet in four regional playdowns which shall be double knock-out.

Re COLTS COMPETITION (p.40)

Revise 3 to read:

3. The thirty-two winners of the sixteen zone playdowns shall meet in four regional playdowns which shall be double knock-out and the eight winners of the regional playdowns shall meet in the finals which shall be a round robin event.

Re MASTERS COMPETITION (p.41)

2. The thirty-two winners of the sixteen zone playdowns shall meet in four regional playdowns which shall be double knock-out and the eight winners of the regional playdowns shall meet in the finals which shall be a round robin event.

A D D I T I O N A L C O M M E N T S

The controversy surrounding the playoff draw provisions for the Labatt Tankard Championship at Peterborough represents an important item of unfinished business for this committee and for the OCA.

The decision that an extended definition of playoff draw provisions be established beyond that covered in the handbook was substantiated by the five-way tie for third place following the round robin in Peterborough. On the other hand the dissatisfaction expressed with this year's arrangements suggests that further analysis should precede next season's competition. Based on experience to date, the item will receive priority consideration by all relevant OCA Committees, leading to clarification of the provisions for 1985 prior to next season.

In March, 1984 the CCA appointed a task force to determine the feasibility of reorganizing the documentation covering rules. A strong feeling is reported from Canadian curling communities that the CCA has incorporated a number of rules which are primarily significant for competitive events in THE RULES OF CURLING section of the CCA handbook thereby placing unnecessary restrictions on recreational curlers.

It is suggested that these provisions should more appropriately appear in the RULES FOR COMPETITIONS section as should definitions of specific penalties (such as those specified this year at Canadian championships for hog line delivery violations, etc.).

The outcome of this task force's activities will significantly influence the content and format of future rules documentation.

The Chairman of this Committee, Jack Kyle, elaborated on a number of items included in this Report. On the proposal of the Chairman, the report was seconded and carried.

REPORT OF THE COMPETITIONS COMMITTEE

This year the Association instituted a new playoff format through the zones by creating two winners at zone level, thus increasing the number of teams at regional play to eight from four. This resulted in reducing zone play time and created a more interesting regional playoff. Through input from letters, and opinions sought at the various playdowns, we have determined that the change was beneficial and it will remain in place.

Once again this year, two events were scheduled simultaneously at the same club on two different occasions and, as a result of discussions with the curlers who participated last year, scheduling of games was more staggered and met with the approval of the competitors. This pairing of events will continue wherever possible.

The year 1983/84 saw a general increase in entries for our events which augurs well for the future. It is the intention of the Association to hold the line on competition fees for the 1984/85 season (Labatt Tankard \$80, other competitions \$60).

Once again, I appeal to all curlers in the O.C.A. jurisdiction to write to the Chairman of Competitions, care of the O.C.A. office, with your concern or criticisms so that they may be properly considered by this committee.

My sincere thanks to the clubs who hosted O.C.A. events, Zone, Regional and Provincial - the chairpersons, the committee workers and the umpires and ice-makers; and our special thanks to our sponsors, whose continued support and co-operation make these events the success they are each year.

I would also like to thank the Zone Representatives who give many hours of their time voluntarily to the needs and concerns of the Association and its member clubs. A special thanks to Eric Wiffen whose help and advice have made the past three years much easier for me to function in this position.

The 1984/85 dates and locations for O.C.A. Finals are listed on the attached sheet.

Also on the attached sheet is a breakdown of rinks competing in the Zone Playdowns for the years 1982/83 and 1983/84.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate the winning rinks who won the Ontario Finals in each O.C.A. playdown, and particular congratulations to the Ontario teams who represented our Association in the National Championship.

Further to the Report, John Scott announced the inauguration of a Seniors Mixed competition to commence in the 1984/85 season. John Scott also announced that zone crests will in future (and also retroactive to the 1983/84 season) be awarded to the winning teams of both the "A" and "B" sides in all single team competitions.

John Scott moved the adoption of the report and this motion was seconded and carried.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the financial status of our Association as of March 31, 1984 supported by the unaudited statement is respectfully submitted by the Finance Committee (this statement will be audited prior to the annual meeting). Members of this Committee were Bill Hargreaves (Barrie), Walter Costello (Grand Bend) and Fred Vine, Chairman (London).

During the summer of 1983 a budget was prepared which forecast an acceptable profit for 1983/84. Unfortunately we are forced to report a deficit position of approximately \$6,000. I will discuss in detail the items in the financial statement that have a direct bearing on the deficit.

Membership and Fees

- Canadian Curling Association (CCA) \$25.00 per sheet of ice per club.
- Ontario Curling Association (OCA) \$3.25 membership per senior male member.
- Participants Card \$5.00 for each male entering a competition at club level leading to a National championship. (One card covers all competitions)

The OCA Registered membership for 1983/84 was just under 26,000 members.

The new system placed in effect in the 1983/84 season has worked out very well with the exception of the Participants Cards; we had trouble getting the returns in to Eric Wiffen in the OCA office. As National Event play-offs begin at club level prior to 15 January, returns on Participants Cards should be complete and cheques forwarded to the OCA office by 1 February at the latest.

Competition entries were up considerably, resulting in an increase in revenue of over \$13,000, however, costs were up also resulting in almost a break even situation. No increase in Competition Entry Fees is recommended for 1984/85.

Wintario Grant

Our Wintario Grant was reduced in mid-season from \$19,000 (budgeted) to \$9,000 - creating a \$10,000 shortfall in income for the current year. It was the greatest single factor contributing to our budget deficit position. Present information indicates that the Wintario Grant for 1984/85 will be around \$9,000.

OCA ZONE AND CLUB REPRESENTATIVES

The Semi-Annual Meeting was originally established in 1979 as a workshop for the Competitions Committee and Zone Representatives. It now embraces the complete executive, thus reducing Director Meetings and expenses, but increasing Zone Representatives and Semi-Annual Meeting expenses. The meeting assembles Friday evening and runs through Sunday.

Zone Meetings, Spring and Fall, all OCA Club Representatives and Club Presidents-Elect attend. The purpose is to fully brief all club representatives on the latest information, rule changes, fee structures, etc., and set dates and locations for all OCA events in their zone for the ensuing year. The Zone Representative presides at this meeting. The Executive Director and a member of the OCA Management Committee attend all zone meetings.

NATIONAL FINALS REPRESENTATIVES

Costs were increased this year because of distances involved: Labatt Brier in Victoria, B.C., Seniors in St. John's, NFLD., and the Seagrams Mixed in Prince Albert, SASK. Also, representative's travel expenses to the Seniors and Mixed are now fully paid by Provincial Associations.

RESERVE FUND

Our Reserve Fund for Future Events, etc., is only \$8,000. Major events within the province in the near future include; Labatt Brier in Kitchener in 1986, Silver Broom in Toronto in 1986, National Mixed at Bayview in Toronto in 1985, and the National Seniors in Barrie in 1986.

Your Executive recommends that we aim to increase this Reserve Fund to around \$20,000 within five years.

RECOMMENDATION

To ensure a self-sufficient, stronger organization your Executive decided to recommend an increase in the membership fee to \$4.00 for the year 1984/85.

GENERAL

At this time I would like to recognize and thank our sponsors; Ministry of Culture and Tourism, Wintario, Labatts, Seagrams, Pepsi Cola, and Minard's, who have all supported us financially and otherwise over the past year in our various competitions and the general promotion of curling.

Your Finance Committee recommends the appointment of Coopers and Lybrand as auditors for the 1984/85 fiscal year.

Finally, in moving the adoption of this report, I wish to again thank the members of my committee and most of all our Executive Director, Eric Wiffen, who has been a great help throughout my first year in this appointment.

It was felt by the membership that all efforts should be made in the coming year to reduce the deficit incurred over the last two years. Fred Vine stated that he felt that there could still be some doubt regarding the input of Provincial Government money including Wintario funding and that it was his Committee's intention to make every effort to ensure the Association was completely self-supporting.

The report of the Finance Committee was moved, seconded and carried.



REPORT OF THE DELEGATE TO THE ONTARIO CURLING FEDERATION

The officers of the O.C.F. Management Committee for the 1983/84 season were:

Chairman - John Cain
1st Vice Chairman - Sharon Legault
2nd Vice Chairman - John Doty
Executive Director - Mort Cooper

The Federation has three basic functions:

1. To liaise with the Provincial Government on all matters relating to curling on behalf of the 8 Associations in Ontario,
2. To co-ordinate instructional programs throughout the Province, and
3. To assist with the promotion of the game within the Province.

During the past year, the Ontario Ministry of Tourism and Recreation revised the Wintario Grant Program due to declining revenue, which seriously hurt the O.C.A.'s Wintario funding for competitions this past winter. Also, the Ministry developed new guidelines for the Ontario Winter Games program which will eliminate curling from the 1985 Winter Games. The Federation has expressed concern to the Ministry about the possible serious effect these limitations will have on curling. Hopefully, solutions will be found. Curling needs all the help it can get from the Government.

John McCrae reported to last year's Annual General Meeting that the O.C.A. had proposed the Federation accept responsibility for organizing and conducting the ice technicians' course formerly operated by the O.C.A. As a result, the Federation's operations have been expanded to include programs of ice technicians, coaching and officiating, in addition to the instructor training program the Federation has co-ordinated for many years. At present, a special committee - under the chairmanship of the O.C.A.'s Robert Heartwell - and with the financial assistance of the Ministry of Tourism and Recreation, is collecting material and developing course content to establish a Club Management program and reference manual. It is intended to conduct four seminars in the Fall of 1984.

In addition, the Federation recently purchased a portable promotional display unit which is to be made available to all Provincial Associations and curling clubs within the Province to promote the game.

It has been a busy and productive year for the Federation, and I would like to express the thanks of this Association to the Federation's Executive Director, Mort Cooper, and to the Ministry of Tourism and Recreation's Sports Consultant, Marj Keast, for their interest and valuable assistance in these programs.

This report was presented by John Doty and was duly moved, seconded and carried. John Doty then introduced Mort Cooper, Executive Director of the Ontario Curling Federation who presented further details of the programs offered by the Federation.

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVE TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE CANADIAN
CURLING ASSOCIATION AND THE CANADIAN CURLING CHAMPIONSHIP FOR THE
LABATT BRIER TANKARD

As your President I attended the Annual C.C.A. Meeting in Victoria on March 8, 1984. Other members from the O.C.A. executive who attended this meeting and committee meetings during Brier week were John Doty, Walter Costello, Robert Heartwell, Jack Kyle and Fred Vine. Past President Graham Farnell was also in Victoria.

President Ray Kingsmith opened the meeting with his report followed by reports from the chairman of the various committees of the C.C.A. President Ray highlighted several points in his report including the following:

A lease was signed October 21st for what will be our Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in Winnipeg's Assiniboine Park Pavilion.

Curling has been included as a demonstration sport in the 1988 Olympics to be held in Calgary. The method of determining Canada's representative has not yet been finalized.

The 1985 National Senior Ladies and Mens Championships will be held jointly at Yorkton, Saskatchewan.

The 1985 National Mixed Championship will be held at Toronto's Bayview Club and it will be the lead off championship to be played February 10-16. No sponsor has yet been obtained for this event.

A motion was passed whereby all bids for the right to host the Silver Broom or any other International Championship must be approved by the C.C.A. and that the C.C.A. will levy a per seat assessment on all Silver Brooms hosted in Canada.

At the Finance Committee Meeting the chairman indicated that the C.L.C.A. was prepared to contribute financially to the operation of the National Mixed Championship if the C.C.A. would discontinue collecting the \$5.00 participants fees from female curlers. This was passed on a one year trial basis.

Several rule changes were discussed and are covered in the report presented by Jack Kyle, Chairman of the Organization, Constitution and Rules Committee.

At the International Committee meeting it was noted that there is in attendance at the Brier a seven man delegation from Japan to investigate all aspects of our game, particularly the way in which our national championships are being run. It was also noted that in 1986 all three world championships will return to Canada. The Silver Broom will be held in Toronto, the Uniroyal World Junior at Dartmouth N.S., and the Pioneer World Ladies at Kelowna, B.C.

The 1985 Labatt Brier Championship will be held in Moncton, N.B. and the 1986 Brier will be held in Kitchener, Ontario. It was noted that Thompson Holidays from Vancouver will handle travel, accomodation and tickets for at least the next two Briers. Anyone wishing to travel to Moncton should contact a local C.P. air agent.

As part of the Junior Men's Committee report a motion was passed that all coaches accompanying teams to the Pepsi Junior Championship must be at least 21 years of age and hold a valid National Coaches Certification (Curl Canada of at least Level I).

The election of officers of the C.C.A. was held and the following slate is the new management committee for 1984-85:

A perfect record of seven wins at the Ontario Senior Mens' Provincial Finals held at the Royal Canadian Curling Club, Toronto, gave the team from Humber Highland the honour of representing Ontario at the Canadian finals, hosted by the St. John's Curling Club, Newfoundland, March 11-17, 1984.

The team, skipped by Earle Hushagen with vice Keith Johnson, second Bert Baragar and lead Ed Little, had an enviable record of 10 wins and 1 loss at St. John's to place them in runner-up position, and their one loss went down to the last rock of the game.

The winning Gunnlaugson team from Manitoba needed to win all its games to capture the gold medallion and set a new record by taking top honours for three consecutive years.

We can be justly proud of our O.C.A. team for their tremendous effort and for the added honours they received as Ed Little and Earle Hushagen (tied with Gunnlaugson) were awarded individual plaques for best lead and best skip, the result of balloting for the all-star team by their fellow competitors.

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVE TO THE PEPSI JUNIOR MENS CANADIAN
CURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

The Thornhill Country Club rink of Steve Hartley, skip; Ian Robertson, third; Rob Lobel, second; Rodney Muir, lead; and Art Lobel, coach, represented the O.C.A. in the Canadian Junior Men's Curling Championship. They qualified by winning an extra-end playoff game against Dave Collyer's rink from Smiths Falls, at the Provincial Finals held at the Barrie Curling Club, January 19-22, 1984.

The Canadian Championship was held at the Assiniboine Memorial Curling Club in Winnipeg, Manitoba, February 19-25, 1984. This was an excellent site for the national event. The host committee went all out to have good ice, for the curlers and fans alike, and to provide hospitality that would be second to none. Ralph Bullock, the General Chairman, and his committee are to be congratulated for an exceptionally well organized and successful event.

Our Ontario rink compiled an excellent record of 7 wins and 4 losses during the round-robin portion of the competition. Unfortunately, they fell one win short of qualifying for the play-offs; however, their record was good enough to place them alone in 4th place. 

During the course of the meeting, a number of special guests were introduced by the President: Clif Thompson, President of the International Curling Federation; Doug Maxwell, Director of Competitions and Promotion, International Curling Federation; Warren Hanson, Director, Marketing and Public Relations, C.C.A. Mr. Hanson referred to the election of the President, Joe Gurowka, as Third Vice-President of the Canadian Curling Association.

Hart Waldon was presented with the Curl Canada Award of Merit, awarded at the A.G.M. of the C.C.A.

Rick Base was presented with the C.C.A. Award for Coach of the Year, awarded at the C.C.A. A.G.M.

Hart Waldon, on behalf of the Association, presented to Robert Lilly an Honorary Life Membership in the Association for his services to the game, particularly in the area of Junior Development.

Recognition was given to members of teams that represented the O.C.A. at National Finals: the Ed Werenich team, winners of the Labatt Tankard; members of the Peter File team, winners of the Five Star Mixed competition; members of the Earle Hushagen team, winners of the Seniors competition; members of the Steve Hartley team, winners of the Pepsi Junior Mens competition.

REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The President presented the report of the Nominating Committee. No further nominations having been received, its adoption was proposed, seconded and carried. The retiring members of the Executive Committee were introduced to the meeting and thanked by the President for their contribution to the Association during their term of office. A list showing the 1984/85 Executive is attached to these Minutes.

In the retiring address, Joe Gurowka said -

This will be the last time that I have the opportunity to address you before I pass from the position of your president to assume the traditional role of sage and elder statesman of the Past President. To say that I will not miss the battle cry, and the challenge of being on the firing line of our association would be less than honest.

It would also be completely out of character to sing to you the plaintive song of the swan, because I will continue to do what I can to fulfill the goals of the association. We should all remember that the O.C.A. like any institution can drift away from those it is designed to serve, into isolation. The curlers in this area must recognize that your primary concern is the curlers' interests and the curlers must know that you are striving to fulfill your responsibility to them daily. This association must not only recognize and discharge its responsibility, it must be seen to do so. This association must talk to the curlers if it is to remain vital, responsive, progressive, if it is to survive.

Earlier in the meeting reports were given by the various committee chairman. It is evident from these reports that the various committees have worked hard and diligently on your behalf. My personal thanks go to each of these gentlemen and to all of our zone reps and club reps for the hard work they have done and the enthusiasm they have displayed. Special thanks must go to our Executive Director, Eric Wiffen for his extra efforts this year since he not only had to take up any slack created by a President that continued to curl competitively during his term of office but also to manage the curling office single handedly with only some part time help.

Many clubs have assisted greatly in our various programs by providing ice and club facilities and we thank them sincerely.

To our Sponsors, Labatts, Pepsi-Cola, Seagrams and Minards we welcome their corporate participation in our game. This association is deeply indebted to them for their contributions both in time and in a monetary manner. We hope that this participation will continue in future years.

To the print and electronic media who have a great influence on how our game is received in the world of sport my sincere thanks for your contribution to our game.

During the past year I have had the opportunity to attend all of the O.C.A. event finals except the Colts and Masters which were held at the same time as the Brier. It is gratifying to see the display of curling skills and enthusiasm that one witnessed at these events.

Certainly one of the highlights of my curling career that did occur was my election to the position of third vice-president of the Canadian Curling Association. According to the current progression I will have the opportunity to serve as President of the Canadian Curling Association during the 1988-89 season. The last C.C.A. President that came from the O.C.A. ranks was Bill Currie who served in 1974. This will represent a 15 year gap, one which I hope will be shortened for any future C.C.A. Presidents from the O.C.A.

In closing we must set goals and priorities in the coming years. These goals must be realistic, obtainable and set within the economical framework of our organization. If we are to obtain these goals we must have firm, aggressive and dedicated leadership in the coming years. As my term of office comes to an end it is gratifying to know that the Ontario Curling Association is in the hands of capable and dedicated people.

It has been a privilege to have served as President of your association.

John Doty presented the outgoing President with his Past President's jacket and also a framed Association crest acknowledging the President's year of service.

Joe Gurowka introduced the new President, John Doty who said -

"Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen: It is an honour and a privilege to serve this organization as President and I thank all the members of this Association for having chosen me to serve. I was initially elected to the Executive Committee in 1975 and I must say that, not only have I found the past nine years to be most enjoyable but also personally rewarding. I hope my year as your President will be more of the same.

I am the third President in the long history of this Association to come from Ottawa. The Ottawa Valley appeared to ignore the O.C.A. for many years due to their affiliation with the Canadian Branch R.C.C.C. Ed Lavelley broke the ice in 1969 and Eldon Wimperis followed in 1978. It is an honour to follow these two highly regarded "boys from the Valley".

When taking office, every new President should have his objectives; I am no different. To highlight a few - none are very radical and most fairly obvious:

Eldon Wimperis, in accepting office in 1978, expressed concern that membership registrations dropped from 37,934 in 1965 to 32,052 in 1977 - a drop of almost 6,000 in 12 years. Fred Vine, our Finance Chairman, in his annual report presented to this meeting, indicated registrations "just under 26,000" - a further drop of 6,000 but in one-half the time, just six years. Is this reduction a result of fewer participants in the game or fewer memberships in the O.C.A.? I hope to find out. We want to see participation in the game grow.

Since turning over to the Ontario Curling Federation our ice technicians and club management courses and withdrawing from the instructional clinic program, we have, during the past year, placed greater emphasis on our Promotions and Public Relations Committee. "The History of Curling" brochure is one of their products and I look to this Committee under Norm Johnson's chairmanship for the development of new material, the improvement in our communications with member clubs and the strengthening of our relationships with our sponsors. Also, we must do our part to strengthen the game at the club level; while zone entries are increasing, memberships in clubs are decreasing.

The Annual has not been published for several years. Norm Johnson's Committee will examine the possibility of again publishing this booklet in some form in 1985.

As indicated in Jack Kyle's report, we will again study our playoff system. Also, the C.C.A. is examining the feasibility of separate rules for competitions from those acceptable to the so-called recreational curler. This Association strongly endorses this study.

We will consider the desirability of reprinting our Constitution, Bylaws and Rules of the Game; I believe this is overdue.

We will study and hopefully improve our method of distributing the C.C.A. competitors' cards and collecting the receipts. Our present system is cumbersome and the results questionable, to say the least.

Ladies and Gentlemen, it sounds like a busy year - I'm sure it will be. Again, thank you for the opportunity to serve as your President - I look forward to the valuable contribution of every member of this Executive in making this next curling season one of the most successful in the long history of this Association.

My first official function as your President gives me a great deal of pleasure - to thank Mr. Joe Gurowka on your behalf for his dedication in fulfilling the responsibilities of this office during the past year. As you all know, Joe has been elected a Vice-President of the C.C.A. and I wish him good luck in his new capacity. From our experience, I would say the C.C.A. has acquired a capable and conscientious administrator."

The meeting adjourned at 4:40 p.m.
