John Glenn introduced the Past Presidents and Honourary Life Members in attendance and asked them to stand and be recognized.

John Glenn thanked the OCA sponsors for their continued support and introduced Dave Bryson from Labatt and Keith Kobelt, Tim Belcourt and Grieves Hay from All Canada.

Judy Weaver was introduced as the new President of the Ontario Ladies Curling Association. She brought greetings from her association and indicated that she was looking forward to the continuing relationship with the OCA.

The new President of the Ottawa Valley Curling Association, Don Patterson, was then introduced and brought greetings from his members.

Tom Ward, President of the Toronto Curling Association spoke and advised that the OCA would now have representation on their Board.

The Chairperson of the 1994 Scott Tournament of Hearts, Audrey Cook spoke about the new facility that the event would be staged in and invited everyone to attend.

Dave Parkes, General Manager of the Canadian Curling Association was introduced and spoke about the exciting changes and bright future of the sport with curling becoming a full medal sport beginning with the 1998 Olympics and with the Season of Champions beginning in 1995 where all the national and world championships will be televised. He also thanked the OCA for their efforts in working closely with the national association.

Fred Robbins of the Fergus Curling Club was introduced and spoke briefly about the beginning of the Ontario Curling Hall of Fame & Museum.

Presentations were then made to retiring members of the Executive Committee. Rob Bremner, "Buck" Rogers and Noel Southwick were unable to be present personally to receive these tokens of appreciation.

Honourary Life Membership and a special curling picture were presented to George Wright. George thanked everyone for the support that he been given over the years and advised that he would be happy to assist the OCA when asked.

Outgoing President, John Glenn, made a few remarks, thanking the Executive Committee and office staff for their support and assistance during the year. He indicated that he felt some of the goals he had spoken about when he took office had been met, referring to the Information Session and the OCA Ice Program.

John Glenn then presented incoming President, John Jefferson with a President's crest and asked him to say a few words. John Jefferson thanked the members present for their confidence and stated that he expected that the Executive Committee and office staff would provide him with the support they have shown to his predecessors. He made a few remarks about the Ontario Curling Hall of Fame & Museum and asked everyone to support the endeavour by providing memorabilia for display.

John Jefferson then presented outgoing President, John Glenn, with a President's ring and a Past President's pin and thanked him for his efforts during the past year.

REPORT OF THE COMPETITIONS COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1993-1994

The Competitions Committee commenced activities for the 1993-94 curling season with its annual September Workshop in Guelph. This weekend was well attended by the zone coordinators and zone representatives. There was very informative discussion regarding rules, officiating and especially scheduling with the changes required due to the upcoming "Season of Champions".

The 16 fall and spring zone meetings were held during the 1993-94 season and were also well attended by the OCA club representatives. Invitations for these meetings included a request for the club president or appropriate member of the executive to attend. This was done to assist the club representative in promoting OCA activities. The OCA fixture card was distributed along with considerable OCA, CCA and Federation materials. Other OCA matters concerning membership, fees, club management, rules and competitions were discussed.

Competition entries for the 1993-94 season totalled 1984, equalling the previous year, which was a positive sign due to the increase in entry fees and the general economy. Attached is a comparison of entries for the last six years. Over the past few years, the declining number of entries for the double-rink competitions has been a concern and, after considerable discussion, it was felt that a change was in order. It was decided that the Bell Mobility Governor-General's be changed to a mixed competition with the Cellular Canada Silver Tankard remaining unchanged. The entries for the Governor-General's for the past year were still down. However, it is felt that it will take another year or two for this change to be accepted and we look to the 1994-95 season for a considerable improvement. To effect this, the two events have been separated by date to allow men to compete in both. We are still seeing an increase in the junior entries, which is also a very positive sign for the future of curling in the province.

The Association would like to thank our member clubs for hosting zone, regional and provincial playdowns this past season. Your support is critical to the success of these championships and we look forward to our continued good relationship. A list showing the host sites for the 1994-95 provincial championships is attached.

Congratulations are extended to all our provincial winners in 1993-94, a list of these winners is attached for your information.

This past season, officiating was once again kept to a minimum at the provincial finals for the Blue Light Tankard, Seagram's V.O. Mixed., Joe Todd Sr. Provincial Seniors and Pepsi Junior Men. Thank you to all who assisted with the officiating.

The 1995 Unitel Mixed (Canadian Mixed Curling Championship) will be held in January at the Sarnia Golf & Curling Club. Since Ontario is the host province, we are entitled to two entries. To determine the second entry, a Mixed Challenge was held at the Guelph Curling Club, April 15-19, 1994 and a full compliment of 32 teams participated. The rink comprised

of Ed Werenich (Skip), Jane Hooper (Third), Pat Perroud (Second) and Lynn Werenich (Lead) were declared the winners and will represent the OCA as the second entry.

The three-rock Free Guard Zone Rule was extended to all OCA competitions this past season. In addition, the CCA adopted this rule on a two-year trial basis for all their national championships.

During this past year considerable work was done regarding the structure of zones 1-8. Proposals were distributed at the spring zone meetings with comments requested at the 1994 fall zone meetings. Any changes will be introduced for the 1995-96 season.

The Association would like to express our appreciation to our sponsors for their generous support of our provincial championships and the game of curling. Without their support, it would be most difficult to schedule these events.

In January 1995, television coverage of the "Season of Champions" will be introduced which will provide curling coverage on network television of more than 150 hours. A list of events and dates is attached and your television viewing guide will advise whether coverage is carried on TSN or CBC.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Competitions Committee for their commitment and support over the past season. A special thank you is extended to John McCrae (General Manager) and Cec Wintonyk (Executive Secretary) for their continued dedicated assistance.

REPORT OF THE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1993-1994

On Saturday, February 12, 1994, the 1994 OCA Information Session was to have taken place at the site of the Blue Light Tankard in St. Thomas. Unfortunately, due to an overwhelming and very disappointing lack of response from our clubs, the Information Session was cancelled. It is very disheartening to have programs rejected by the very clubs who need them in order to improve the product they provide to their membership. Curling clubs are in the "entertainment" business and with all the competition for member's leisure activities dollars, all of our member clubs should be attempting to gather all of the information that they can in order to remain competitive.

Although it was necessary to cancel the 1994 Information Session, it is hoped that another project will take place in the coming year. The OCA has volunteered Kingston as a location for a CCA/Curl Ontario development workshop in club marketing and management.

The OCA Development Committee continues with the "Membership - The Heart of Curling" program. The "Curl Aid" Directory of Expertise continues to grow and is available to our member clubs. Any clubs that require copies of the material contained in the directory should contact the OCA office.

The OCA Ice Program continues to provide assistance and programs for our member clubs. Two reference manuals were provided to the Ice Technician and Ice Chairman of each club at the fall zone meetings and further expansion of the safety sections of those manuals are planned during the upcoming season. A number of clubs contacted the Ice Team members and assistance with rocks and ice was provided. I wish to thank OCA Ice Technician Shorty Jenkins and his team members Gord Carroll, Teo Frans and Joe Hahn for their assistance and dedication.

On March 25-27, 1994 the second annual Junior International Bonspiel between curlers from the OCA and the Grand National Curling Club of America took place at the Schenectady Curling Club in Schenectady, New York and by all accounts was judged to be very successful. I would like to thank Bob Allan and Tom Ward for their leadership and direction of this event and for their report which is attached. In 1995 the event will return to Canada and take place in the Ottawa area.

Elementary school curling continues to prosper and grow and I wish to thank Glenn Rowlandson of this committee for his efforts in this regard. Glenn's report on the 1994 John Deere Elementary School Curling Championship is attached.

The Ontario School Curling Committee continues to administer the Gore Mutual Schoolboy championship and to promote high school curling. I commend Hugh Spencer and his committee for their fine work.

I would personally like to thank the members of my committee, Shorty Jenkins, Bob Allan,

Tom Ward, Glenn Rowlandson, Hugh Spencer, John Doolan, Jim Irwin, Rick Clift and President-Elect Mel Sanders for their assistance this year.

REPORT ON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CURLING FOR THE YEAR 1993-1994

The MacTier Curling Club hosted the 1994 John Deere Elementary School Championship with 48 teams participating. Teams came from as far as Iroquois in the east, Parry Sound in the north, Ingersoll in the southwest, Kincardine in the west and Welland in the south and at least half of the participants were at the event for the first time.

William Beatty Public School from Parry Sound won the championship and earned the John Deere Elementary Schools Provincial Curling Championship banner in an exciting extra end game.

Plans are well underway for the 1995 event which will be held at the Elmira & District Curling Club February 17-19, 1995. It is hoped that at least 48 teams will participate with games being played at both Elmira and the Elora Curling Club.

Many compliments were received by the host committee from MacTier for the "fun" weekend experienced by all the participants. In addition to using the ice at the curling club, four sheets of curling ice was created in the skating rink by OCA Ice Team member, Teo Frans and curling stones were provided by the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario Curling Association. There were 6 events with 12 teams qualifying from the original 48 teams.

A survey prepared by the host committee was given to all of the coaches to assist in the future planning of the event. Forty-four responses were received indicating that the event should remain a one weekend "fun" bonspiel with as many teams as possible participating. They also felt that the host committee should be allowed to control the number of entries and the 1995 committee is considering a 64 team event.

I wish to thank the MacTier Curling Club and Host Committee Chairman, Robert Belecque for the outstanding weekend they put on for our young curlers. Thank you also to our sponsor, John Deere Limited for their support and to their Orillia representative, Ed Healey for making himself available to present prizes. Thank you also to the OCA zone representatives for their assistance in promoting Elementary School Curling.

**REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE
FOR THE YEAR 1993-1994**

This report, together with the auditor's draft of the financial statements, which are attached, sets out the financial position of the Ontario Curling Association as of May 31, 1994.

The past year produced a surplus of revenue over expenditures of approximately \$30,000, nearly offsetting a loss of about \$35,000 in the previous fourteen month period.

Revenues were close to budget with slightly higher competition entry fees resulting from a new event offsetting an unexpected cut in government grants. Significant savings resulted from careful control of competition expenses and the absence of an Ontario world finalist.

Expenses for the competitions workshop, the annual general meeting and committee meetings were also well under budget, and office and administration expenses were slightly below budget.

The committee would like to thank all those who assisted in producing this successful financial result, with particular recognition of the contribution of John McCrae and Cec Wintonyk.

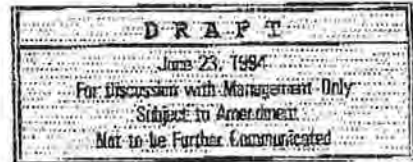
The committee recommends the re-appointment of Coopers & Lybrand as auditors for the 1994-95 fiscal year.

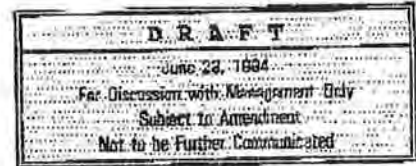

AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS

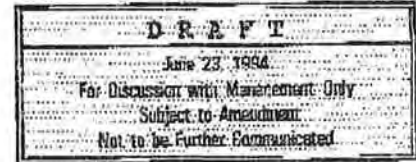

4. Long-Term Debt

Long-term debts consists of a loan payable in blended monthly instalments of principal and interest of \$510. The automobile has been pledged as security. Principal repayments of \$3,118 will be made during fiscal 1995.

5. Special Event Fund

A donation of \$100,000 was received in a prior year from the family of Joe Todd Sr. These funds are used for special events as approved by the executive committee and have been set aside in a special event surplus fund.

6. Operating Lease Commitments

The Association leases its office space for a base monthly rental fee of \$436. The lease expires November 30, 1994. The Association also leases office equipment for \$397 a month expiring May 31, 1998.

As in previous years, the primary task of the committee is to effect various rule changes as they are initiated either by the OCA Executive Committee or the Canadian Curling Association. A summary of the changes for 1994-95 are outlined on the attached addendum.

Over the past year, the umpires-in-chief were called upon to make a number of rulings. All situations were handled in the best interest of the game and to the satisfaction of the parties involved.

As a result of declining attendance at the Annual Meeting, for various reasons, the Management Committee and Executive Committee spent a good portion of the past year reviewing the constitution and developing an alternative method of conducting the same business more efficiently and effectively. Pending positive approval at this Annual Meeting, these changes will be in effect in 1994-95. A revised copy of the constitution was forwarded to each club.

A study was conducted upon completion of the 1994 Blue Light Tankard in St. Thomas to determine if the use of on and off-ice officials was deemed effective and useful by the players and the officials themselves. The results of the study indicated that both the method of officiating and effectiveness of officiating was good and that we should continue with the program as it is currently set up. The response to the survey was 90% which indicates that our competitors and volunteers are interested in the way in which our game is played.

I would like to thank the other members of the committee, Mel Sanders, Jim Sharples, Glen Corner, John Lawrie, Scott Howey and Allan Brunt, who provided all the necessary assistance one could ask for in the past year. Without the efforts of John McCrae and Cec Wintonyk, our association could not function as effectively as it does and I thank you.

The following is a report of the activities of the Promotions Committee.

Media Coverage

An expenditure has been approved to put in place a press clipping service. The purpose of this service is to create a scrapbook/catalogue of various curling stories from local newspapers around southern Ontario. Excerpts from this scrapbook will be distributed to each club to be included in the "Media" section of the OCA manual. These will be provided to better assist our club representatives and club executives in creating articles about their club and activities for their local media. Media contact lists are updated every two years and this will be done in time for the 1995-96 season.

Newspaper Insert

The office staff has been studying the feasibility of providing key media in each zone with club profiles and other relevant information regarding the game for the purpose of developing a pre-season feature story or insert that will encourage readers to join their local club. While this will not be ready for this season, the project is being targeted for next season.

Score Membership Affinity Program

A limited number of OCA Score Membership Cards and an OCA magazine were distributed to each member club president as a test program. The card allowed the holder to purchase product and services at specified merchants at a discounted rate.

The awareness and response levels were disappointing and the Score Promotion computer recorded only sporadic transactions by users of the card.

The Canadian Curling Association has taken up the challenge of developing a membership program. Their main objective is to build a national database of members to enhance curling's sponsor relationship with the grassroots. The attached letter better describes the initiation.



The provincial final was hosted by the Ilderton Curling Club and chaired by Jim Lodge. On behalf of the committee and the curlers, I would like to extend thanks to Jim and his committee for organizing our final and to the people of Ilderton for their support of school curling in Ontario.

Bradford District High School emerged as the provincial champion. The team was comprised of Skip Dale Matchett, Third Jeff Ostien, Second Derek Lindner, Lead Duane Lindner and Coach Barb Graham. A total of 148 teams were entered, down slightly from the previous year.

The Gore Mutual Schoolboy Committee and the OCA is grateful for the financial support we receive from Gore Mutual Insurance Company. The grant from our sponsor of 47 years was \$3,500 this past year.

The entry fee for this event was again \$35.00 of which \$12.00 goes to the OCA. Our major expenses included travel and accommodation to meetings and to the final as well as trophies for four of the eight finalist teams and all-star awards. We would also like to thank the OCA for its financial support of the Gore Mutual Schoolboy playdowns and for the presence at the final of President John Jefferson.

During the past year, schoolboy coaches were surveyed on the question of having 2 teams (the A and B winners) advancing from each zone to the regional playdowns rather than 1 team as is the present case. The overwhelming response was that such a change would be in the best interest of schoolboy curling and would bring "The Gore" into line with other OCA events in term of format. This change will go into effect during the 1994-95 season.

Confirmed sites for future provincials finals are Orangeville in 1995, Peterborough in 1996, Goderich in 1997 and Gananoque in 1998.

REPORT ON THE OCF ANNUAL MEETING FOR THE YEAR 1993-1994

The Annual General meeting of the Ontario Curling Federation took place on Saturday, June 11, 1994 at the Sentaor Hotel in Sudbury. The Ontario Curling Association delegates, John McCrae and Fred Temple were both in attendance.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman, Jow Gurowka, who immediately confirmed, prior to conducting any business, that all member Associations had paid their fees and were, in fact, members in good standing.

Reports were submitted by the various Chairpersons with the most critical report being that of Finance. A deficit was budgeted for the 1994/95 fiscal year. At the present time and including deficits from prior years, the Ontario Curling Federation is some \$25,000.00 in the red. Various measures will be taken over the next fiscal year to correct this position.

Formal job descriptions were submitted for the elected Board of Directors, including the Chairman, Chairman-Elect, Director of Finance, Director of Technical & Junior Development and Director of Promotion and Marketing.

Various constitutional amendments were passed. The most significant change to the Constitution was the change in name from Ontario Curling Federation to Curl Ontario. In addition, the Past Chairman's position was replaced with a Chairman-Elect's position. This will allow the incoming Chairman to gain some experience before actually assuming the role.

Election of the Board of Directors took place and the following candidates were successful:

As a result, a feasibility study begun earlier will continue.

1994 Labatt Brier & CCA Men's Policy Meetings

The 1994 Labatt Brier was held at the new Centrium in Red Deer, Alberta with a total attendance of 131,000 for the 17 draws and 2 playoff games. The final standings at the end of the round robin found British Columbia on top at 10-1, Manitoba in second place at 9-2 and Ontario's Russ Howard in third place at 8-3.

In the semi-final game, Ontario defeated Manitoba by a score of 6-3. Rick Folk of British Columbia defeated Russ Howard in the final game by a score of 8-5 with the quality of shotmaking that was provided by the Free Guard Zone Rule.

The Brier always has to have an issue of controversy in order to achieve front page coverage and this year was no exception. As a result of ambiguous wording in the rule concerning rock selection, both Folk and Howard tried to gain a psychological advantage with both teams lodging a protest. Clearly this rule will have to be clarified before next year's Brier.

All in all it was an excellent event - well played by the competitors and enjoyed immensely by the spectators.

While the curling was going on, the men held their annual policy meetings and many issues were discussed such as the Page format for playoffs, the age for Juniors, the age for Seniors, separate entries for the Yukon and Northwest Territories, game times, collection of competitor cards, terms for CCA board members and support of the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame & Museum to name a few. Many motions were passed and those items were carried forward to the Annual Meeting held in June in Ottawa.

1994 CCA Annual Meeting

The CCA Annual Meeting was held in Ottawa, June 17-19, 1994. The following issues were brought forward from the Men's & Women's Policy Meetings and were discussed and voted on with the following results:

- introduction of the Page playoff system is to begin in 1995 for the Labatt Brier and the Scott Tournament of Hearts
- Yukon, Northwest Territories and Northern Ontario Ladies separate entry bids were withdrawn until the 1995 annual meeting
- junior age to be 20 as of July 1 of the year preceding the national final
- Canada Winter Games age clarification - to be born January 1, not July 1

- seniors age reduction to 45 was defeated
- Calgary to become curling's national training centre
- commencing in 1995, Canadian championship events will have a 70 minute time limit with 2 time-outs per team
- if a curler or team is under suspension in one jurisdiction, that curler or team may not play in any level of playdowns in another jurisdiction
- a competitor may compete in one province or territory only (Northern Ontario to be considered a province)
- if a special meeting is called by at least 20% of the member associations, it shall be convened within 45 days and the cost shall be born by the member associations requesting the meeting
- waiver of notice will require only 75% of the delgates approval - the issue then also requires 75% approval (not the normal majority approval)
- terms of directors to remain at 5 years
- the incoming board members will elect their President & Vice-President at the June meeting
- increased support (a total of \$50,000) to the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame & Museum to set up a permanent site in Kitchener
- all member associations will collect and remit competitor's fees in the same manner and at the same level of competition

Further, it was reported that Olympic status for curling is now assured and approximately \$200,000 was received from the Olympic Committee for the development of Canada's representatives for the 1998 Olympics in Nagano, Japan.

Television coverage for the "Season of Champions" will more than double to 150 hours in the 1994-95 season.

In the area of sponsorship the following items of interest were discussed:

- Labatt has retained title sponsorship of the Brier through 1997
- Ford has become the title sponsor of the World Championships

- Unitel is the title sponsor for the Canadian Mixed championship
- CIBC is the title sponsor for the Canadian Seniors championships

As you can see, many changes have occurred on the Canadian curling scene in the past year and the future looks very positive.
